

This week we have been reading the Tiger That Came to Tea. We completed two guided sketches and learned how to draw the tiger. What wonderful artists we are!



Here are the pupils doing a freeze frame for the phrase 'different angles'.





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
In reading, we acted out scenes from "The Sleeper and the Spindle" by Neil Gaiman.

October is **Black History Month** in the UK, so in the library we will be encouraging children to read about significant people of Black heritage.

I am re-reading 'Respect' by Michaela Morgan, which was the book from which I learned about Walter Tull. Walter was raised in a London

Children's Home, with little hope of fulfilling his potential. However, he rose above his challenging past, and above the prejudice he met, to gain people's respect and become Britain's first Black top-flight footballer - here in Tottenham at Tottenham Hotspurs. Furthermore, he joined the army to fight in WWI, and went on to become the first British-born Black army officer.

This book pays such a tremendous tribute to Tull and had a memorable impact on me when I read it.

Zaria


14th Who is David Neita?

21st ICT/History Inspirational person research and make a poster for display




