In Year 1 this week for our History lesson we had the pleasure of having an amazing WOW lesson, we used our houses that we designed in our Art lessons and recreated Pudding Lane in the playground. We recreated the fire in the bakery. The children really enjoyed this experience and were able to better



understand how it must have felt like to lose their home and precious possessions.





Y2 had a wonderful trip to the Tower of London. We took shelter from the rain in King Edward bedchamber in the Medieval Palace. Our guide, Lady Joan, taught us how to become pages and squires and knighted us in Henry III's room. We spotted several beasts from the royal menagerie and even saw the Crown Jewels!

















Only a week ago we had visitors in during our Geography lesson to talk about growing microgreens and how good they are for us. It fitted in with our discussions about organic food and choices we might make when shopping for food. We all tried a variety of microgreens they brought, from peas to sunflowers, and then we planted these. Only a week later they have shot up brilliantly. One side is broccoli and the other side radish. The radish has split the class between those who love it and those who find it distinctly, "spicy."






